

A trio of small expedition ships play host to our Patagonian voyages: the intrepid *National Geographic Explorer* and state-of-the-art sister ships, *National Geographic Endurance* and *National Geographic Resolution*. Each is stocked with a fleet of Zodiacs that allow us to explore without being dependent on ports or piers, while kayaks let you paddle deep into rocky coves and fjords.

Whether you choose to hike the rugged Patagonian terrain, kayak in brilliant blue lakes, or go on a whale-watching excursion in a marine reserve, you will be able to explore your way, every day.

Exclusive Undersea Program

On each of our voyages, an undersea specialist uses a high-definition video camera and deploys a remotely operated vehicle (ROV) that allows us to peer up to 1,000 feet beneath the water's surface. Footage is shared during daily recaps, inviting guests to witness the swaying kelp forests and surprisingly colorful sea life that thrive in the steely waters below us.



Patagonian Panoramas: Explore More by Small Ship

Patagonia is a land of water and ice, with glacial fields, towering fjords, and remote islands that beg to be explored by sea. Seeing the region's shores from the Lindblad Expeditions-National Geographic fleet is a natural fit—an immersive experience that allows for a nimble approach and rarified access. Here, we share why Patagonia is best discovered aboard our small expedition ships.

Discover Patagonia's Most Remote Corners

In a place as wild and boundless as Patagonia, overland travel isn't just challenging—it can be impossible. Many parts of the region can't be accessed by vehicle; the terrain is often so remote that roads don't exist. Traveling by ship allows you to cover more ground on a single expedition without ever repacking your bags or plane-hopping.

Tidal shifts make Patagonian waterways difficult to navigate, and many remain uncharted. With our experienced teams, entering even the trickiest of inlets is par for the course—and as a guest, you'll find yourself surrounded only by sea, mountains, and sky in places few others have visited.

Exclusive Access Granted Solely to Lindblad Expeditions-National Geographic


Our history of conservation in Patagonia has helped us forge key partnerships that translate to rarified access for guests. For instance, our support of the Wildlife Conservation Society has contributed to a range of projects in Karukinka Natural Park, from building ranger stations to surveying elephant seal colonies. In turn, our travelers enjoy an onboard visit from a Wildlife Conservation Society representative, as well as special access to Karukinka's old-growth forests and gem-like lakes.

On Isla de Los Estados, or Staten Island, you'll see landscapes witnessed only by researchers—because of the island's ecological fragility, the Argentine government tightly restricts access for large vessels. Our guests are among the few non-scientists who get the chance to spot the resident seals, Andean condors, and rockhopper penguins, and to see the lighthouse made famous by Jules Verne as the "Lighthouse at the End of the World."

Experience a New Perspective on Iconic Scenery

At sea level, peaks seem more epic and ice fields more massive. Glaciers come alive from the water, where icebergs calve and meltwater streams off in waterfalls. In a region known for drama, exploring by sea lends you a better look at both its large-scale grandeur and small vignettes, from albatross stretching their wings to the creaks and groans of shifting ice echoing over the fjords—enchanted scenes that define this wild and windswept place.





Exploring by ship gives you a front-row seat to Patagonia's grandeur. At sea level, the peaks seem to tower higher, ice fields encircle you, and glaciers come alive with their calving icebergs and cascading waterfalls.

On our Best of Chilean Patagonia: Fjords, Glaciers, and Torres De Paine expedition, we travel by both land and sea, giving travelers the opportunity to get immersed in the epic onshore scenery. Settle into a world-class lodge like the properties featured here and spend days adventuring amid jagged peaks and gem-like lakes. Or simply relax in your superb accommodations, where nature's beauty takes center stage.


Explora Patagonia Hotel Salto Chico

The five-star Hotel Salto Chico crowns an eponymous waterfall in one of the most picturesque parts of Torres del Paine National Park, where the massive Paine Massif rises into a mesmerizing backdrop. The warm, wood-paneled lodge is connected by catwalk to a spa with a heated pool and open-air jacuzzis—all overlooking the glacially fed, powder-blue waters of the Paine River.



The Singular Patagonia

The Singular Patagonia pays homage to the region's sheep-farming past through the thoughtful renovation of this historic processing plant—now a luxury hotel that blends industrial elements with modern elegance. Rustic details, including preserved machinery and concrete finishings, reflect the stark beauty of the surrounding fjord lands and foster an authentic sense of place at the ends of the Earth.



Tierra Patagonia Hotel & Spa

Looking out over the soaring Torres del Paine, Tierra Patagonia Hotel & Spa is a celebration of its surroundings and a shining model of sustainable tourism. The lodge's innovative architecture incorporates natural materials and design elements of traditional Chilean estancias, while locally sourced cuisine and a world-class spa invite you to experience Patagonia with all your senses.

Uncommon Discoveries in Patagonia and Beyond

Our voyages to South America's southernmost reaches are expertly curated to include unique experiences that allow you to uncover the hidden side of your destination. During our long history of responsibly exploring these wild regions, we have been granted special access to restricted areas and charted courses in wild places rarely explored by travelers.

Península Valdés

A UNESCO World Heritage-listed marine sanctuary, Península Valdés is the world's most important breeding ground for endangered southern right whales. Our arrival coincides with the start of whale season, optimizing our chances of spotting these magnificent creatures in their natural habitat.



Torres del Paine National Park

This stunning park's iconic mountain range—with razor-sharp peaks resembling great granite horns—presides over the Patagonian steppe, home to solitary pumas and herds of guanaco. Discover gem-colored lagoons, glistening glaciers, and lush southern beech forests in this UNESCO Biosphere Reserve.



Karukinka Natural Park

With special permission from the Wildlife Conservation Society, Lindblad Expeditions has access to Karukinka Natural Park, a private reserve of wind-bent forests and wetlands harboring more than 90 animal species, including some of Chile's largest populations of guanaco, culpeo foxes, and Andean condors.



Argentina's Staten Island

Off limits for nearly a century, Isla de los Estados is seldom seen by tourists. Lindblad Expeditions paved the way for sustainable tourism here: *National Geographic Explorer* was the first foreign-flagged vessel given access. Rockhopper penguins and fur seals are among the wildlife that thrives in this protected nature reserve.



Cape Horn

At the southern tip of South America, where the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans meet, Cape Horn marks the northern end of the infamous Drake Passage, where mariners have braved cross currents for centuries. In the rare event that conditions are conducive to landing, you will achieve an explorer's milestone.



The Chilean Fjords

Patagonia's ice-carved coast is lined with spectacular fjords, locally called *senos*. Venture deep into this extensive maze of channels, dotted with tiny islands and framed by subpolar forests. Numerous glaciers flow from the Southern Patagonian Ice Field, depositing icebergs into the deeply carved fjord lands.



Seek Out Patagonia's Big Five

Amid Patagonia's dramatic landscapes, wildlife-lovers will find a menagerie of rare animals that have adapted to their extreme surroundings. Of the more than 60 mammals, 400 birds, and 50 reptiles that have been recorded here, these species earn headline honors as Patagonia's 'big five.' Meet the region's most charismatic creatures, then join us on expedition to seek them out in the wild.

Magellanic Penguin

Penguins outnumber people in the southern reaches of South America, and are especially common on coastal islands, such as Isla Magdalena. These dapper birds—decked out in the classic penguin tuxedo, complete with a bow-tie band—nest in burrows and are often spotted standing guard outside their tunnels.





Darwin's Rhea

A cousin to the ostrich and the emu, this large flightless bird struts across the scrublands, sporting feathers that make it tough to spot despite its size. Shaggy gray and brown plumage blends in perfectly with the vegetation, and when the rhea lowers its head to feed, it could pass for a small bush on the steppe.

Guanaco

The guanaco—along with its llama and alpaca cousins—belongs to the same family as camels, a resemblance you can spot in their long necks and split upper lips. Traveling in large herds on the open Patagonian pampas, guanacos are surprisingly fast, an attribute needed to escape pursuing pumas.



Andean Condor

When factoring in weight and wingspan, Andean condors measure in as the world's largest land birds, and can soar for more than 100 miles without flapping their wings. Their overall numbers are in decline; however, populations remain strong in Patagonia, where it's possible to see a dozen or more of these scavengers circling together.



Puma

Torres del Paine National Park is home to a healthy puma population, in part due to strict protections imposed by the Chilean government. Ranking among the largest species of wild cat in the Americas, pumas are powerful hunters—and typically well fed in Patagonia, thanks to the large herds of guanacos in the region.


